Hi again everyone! We are in week #2 remote learning. I have really enjoyed listening to your Incredibox projects! We are going to continue to use our computers to make music.

This week, we will be using Chrome Music Lab's "Song Maker".

Here are the directions:

- 1) Go to https://musiclab.chromeexperiments.com/Song-Maker/
- 2) You will see a screen with a lot of **squares**, some **circles** at the bottom, and some other things.
- 3) Let see what we can do with the circles! Make sure your **sound is on**.
- 4) Click on a couple of gray circles. When you do, you're hear some **drum sounds** and the circle will turn into a blue circle or a blue triangle (both make different sounds).
- 5) Look on the bottom-left corner to find a **big blue circle with a white triangle:** it's the "play" button. Click it to listen to what you just created!
- 6) Now let's click on some squares. When you do, you're hear some notes and the squares will turn to different colors.
- 7) Try this: click a square and hold down while you drag your mouse around the screen to make lots of notes quickly. This works for squares too!
- 8) Hit the "play" button (big blue circle with a white triangle on the bottom-left) then we can listen again.
- 9) Do you want to change something? If you do, click the "Undo" button on the bottom-right. You can also click on a note to take it away. You can also click the "Restart" button at the top to start over (you can "Undo" this too).
- 10) What if you don't know what kind of song to make? Try some of the "TEMPLATES" (attached below) to get started! You can change them around as much as you want. Experiment to see what other buttons do!
- 11) Once you are done, click the "Save" button on the bottom-right. You can "Download WAV" if you want to keep it for yourself. You can also click "Copy Link" and send it someone! If you send it to someone else, they can change it and send it back to you!
